

prison who never saw their children.

DIRECTORS CORNER

Dear Friends and Supporters:

2021 was such a strange and difficult year for us at AIM. We are heartbroken that we have not been able to bring the children to see their mothers since March of 2020. We know these have been truly hard times for incarcerated mothers and their children having to endure such a long separation. But we have done what we could to give the mothers and children a way to connect. Storybook continued each month —we couldn't make videos, but we dropped off books each month with writing paper and collected them to send out to the children.

Classes also continued via Zoom—we are grateful to the staff at Tutwiler, Montgomery Women's Facility and Birmingham for working with us to allow us to offer classes. Thanks to the Zoom equipment, we were able to offer Parenting Education, Financial Wellness, Forgiveness and Reconciliation, Women's Health Education, and Aerobics throughout the year. Our community partnerships have expanded this year—Region's Bank is helping us with our financial wellness classes. The Jacksonville State School of Nursing and the Department of Public Health partnered with us to start up basic health education classes in January of 2021.

In July, our donors made it possible for our children to have the school supplies they needed. It was an amazing Christmas for the AIM children, through the hard work of Larnetta Moncrief and because of so many generous sponsors!

Throughout 2021, we provided the women at Tutwiler with basic hygiene supplies each month by sponsoring one dorm per month. We continued our Pack a Purse program for women leaving prison. We helped the women at Tutwiler celebrate the holidays, by providing art supplies for the Christmas Dorm decorating contest, and snacks for their Caroling through the halls. We also provided prizes for the winning dorms. And the Montgomery Women's Facility got a pizza party for Christmas this year!

Our group home, Genesis, continued to house women throughout the year. Our residents were part of the essential workforce that bravely went to work every day. We had a few outbreaks of COVID, but all recovered.

We have continued to reach out to vulnerable women living with HIV/AIDS during the past year, with case management and help navigating social services to make sure that they continued in care and stayed safe during this pandemic.

Our community clients in our ARESET program have been receiving training in Work Readiness and we have been able to provide them with the coaching and tools they need to get back into the workforce. I am very grateful to my amazing staff, Larnetta Moncrief, Donna Collins, Danielle Cook, Nydia Saffold, Paulette Nicholas and Deborah Neal for their hard work and dedication during this past year. I am also very grateful to Lazette Moody, my Board Chair and the AIM Board of Directors for their hard work and support this past year.

Although the virus isn't gone yet, we are hopeful that this year we will be able to bring our programs back inside prison walls, and to reunite our families. We wish all of our friends and supporters the Happiest of New Years! Stay safe!!

VISITATION

Visitation is the signature program of AIM. Since 1987, AIM has transported children from around the state to visit with their mother. This visitation is special because it's 3 hours long, we provide a hot lunch, games, activities, and we print photos for the moms and the children to keep. We also make each child feel special for their birthday month by purchasing birthday cupcakes, singing happy birthday, and providing the child with a gift from their mother at the end of visit.

We unfortunately have not had a visit in 2 years do to COVID restrictions. We are hopeful that visits will restart in 2022. New things we hope to bring to visit in 2022, a program for Birmingham Work Release and more opportunities for families to drive themselves to visitation.

With some minor changes Storybook has held strong. We still delivered books monthly to the prison.


Mothers were allowed to pick out a book and leave a written message.

We then mailed the books to children. Approximately 306 children and 124 moms participated in this program in 2021.

NEW AEROBICS CLASS

"Ladies, you have one minute to do as many sit-ups as you can...go!"

Fifteen women in white flop down on mats and start their workout.

Welcome to the Power Hour, our new Aerobics class taught by personal trainer, Romen MacDonald of Squad Fitness via Zoom at Tutwiler. The women are participating in a 6-week class to learn how to do exercises without equipment that will help them tone up and slim down. Each week they are given "homework" to do in their dorms and told to record their progress in journals. Each student received a water bottle and every week they get a healthy snack—such as fruit. The women will have their progress tracked with pre and posttests. We hope to continue offering this class throughout the year.

WHI FI

Each month, women at Tutwiler
have a health education
workshop called WHI FI
(Women's Health Information for
the Incarcerated). Health
professionals provide general
health education on topics such
as breast cancer, STDs and HIV
Prevention, nutrition awareness,
mental health, and heart health.

WHI FI is sponsored by Aid to Inmate Mothers, the Alabama Department of Public Health, Office of Women's Health, and the Jacksonville State Department of Nursing. Project Reconnect took a healthy turn this year. Although still not allowed to enter the facility we still conducted classes via zoom. We reintroduced WHIFI (Women's Health Information for the Incarcerated) a monthly semiar that covered various women health topics. We also introduced a work out class. The class was held weekly women exercised with an instructor via zoom. The women and staff enjoyed the class so much that the Warden allowed them to start an additional class led by an officer.



2021 we received a grant from the Jewish Teen Foundation of Greater Boston for much needed upgrades and repairs to the Service Center. This grant allowed us to get some plumbing fixed, install and replace security cameras, and build shelves in the clothing closet.

In 2021, we had 10 residents live at the service center. We had approximately 50 women utilize and receive other services such clothing, hygiene, household goods, employment search and access to computers.

ARESET

ARESET served over 30
women in 2021. At least
70% of the women in the
program were able to
obtain employment. At
least 10% received jobs that
have made them financially
secure.

The program paid for documents needed to obtain IDs and drivers licenses, work clothing, bus passes and eye glasses.






