HISTORY

Founded in 1987 as a vistiation program for incarcerated women. Aid to Inmate Mothers (AIM) has expanded its services to provide both pre and post release services for women enrolled in the program. Through the use of faithful volunteers, and generous donors this agency has survived 30+ years in providing services to incarcerated women in the state of Alabama.

VISION

To create a criminal justice model that demonstrates respect for and understands the rights of the children affected by their mothers' imprisonment and recognizes and helps to address the many burdens carried by the children and families as a result of incarceration.

MISSION

We provide services to Alabama's incarcerated women with emphasis on enhancing personal growth and strengthening the bonds between inmate mothers and their children.

A WORD FROM THE DIRECTOR

2020 was a challenging year for AIM. On Friday, March 13, 2020 Jeff Dunn, Commissioner of the Department of Corrections, suspended all outside visitation to the prisons. We supported this difficult decision, while feeling the anguish of all incarcerated people. We did not want to expose any of the women to COVID19. This decision put an immediate stop to several of our programs.

We spent months revamping programs to help mothers and children maintain their bonds. With so much uncertainty, these new changes provided opportunities for all women in the prison to participate. We could not have adjusted our programs without the support of the Alabama Department of Corrections and the Wardens. As we patiently wait for updates and recommendations regarding COVID19 we continue to think of ways to keep our programs going strong. We are counting the days until we are back in person in the prison!

PROGRAMS

VISITATION

Our founding program, transports children from all over the state for a three-hour monthly visit with their mother. Unlike regular visits a hot lunch is served, activities, games and lots of hugs and kisses fill the room.

PROJECT RECONNECT

Is for all incarcerated women who are within three years of release or parole. The program teaches various life skills in all three women prisons weekly.

AIM SERVICE CENTER

Home of the GENESIS program, this eight bed transitional housing is offered to women leaving prison. The program is one year long, residents pay rent on a sliding scale, complete chores, and work through individual reentry plans.

ARESET

Employment program partnered with the United Way. The program is for women who are receiving SNAP/food assistance benefits. Participants receive weekly case management to search for employment and maintain employment.

POSITIVE LIVING

HIV education program, provides classes to groups inside the prison and in the community. Through a grant from VIIV Healthcare, we can provide financial support to HIV positive women for various needs.

Visitation

In the history AIM 2020 was the shortest year for our visitation program. We were only able to hold two in person visits in January and February. Sixteen mothers and 30 children participated in those two visits.



We hope to get back to our regular visitation program in 2021. We are also brainstorming ways to continue this program even through the pandemic, by possible providing families on our programs with tablets to visit with their mother and be able to send electronic mail. Some of our families may need assistance with internet services and understanding the program. We are happy to provide support for the many families apart of our visitation program.




In November the prison system started a video visitation service to reconnect prisoners with their family and friends. The Alabama Department of Corrections said the system is expected to be rolled out to all prisons by early December. Inmates are able to utilize the video kiosks by appointment. They are also beginning an electronic messaging service where friends and family can send emails, cards and photos.



Volunteers from the Jr. League of Montgomery, packed over 70 packages to mail to children on our visitation program. Mothers wrote letters, we included pictures from their visit, small toys/gifts and gift cards.

Storybook



Who doesn't love a good bedtime story? For some children hearing this story from their mother is the most exciting part of their day. Due to the pandemic we had to make a few changes to our program. For the safety of the women and volunteers we did not go inside the prisons to make recordings of the mothers reading.



Instead books were sent in mothers chose a book and wrote a letter to their children. We then retrieved and mailed the packages to the children.

Project Reconnect

Like our other programs, Project Reconnect was placed on a brief hold. AIM Staffer Deborah Neal, was able to coordinate with Tutwiler and we are now able to provide classes via zoom. Class sizes are three-fourths smaller due to accommodations required for the safety of participants. We had 206 women participate in Project Reconnect in 2020.

AIM Service Center



2020 closed doors for many people, but for several ladies in the GENESIS program it opened doors. Eleven women participated in the program in 2020.

Our house mother Stephanie moved in to her first apartment and purchased a new car. Stephanie took full advantage of our program in 2018 and 2019 she became our house mother. In 2020 she was ready to try it on her own.

We had two ladies transfer home to their families in New York and Ohio. Both served over 10 years at Tutwiler. While they waited for transfers, we helped them get identification cards, social security cards, social security benefits and medical treatment.

Even through the pandemic staff has remained faithful to this program. Working a skeleton schedule to keep the house staffed daily.

ARESET

ARESET is a Job Readiness program that AIM has been a part of since 2019. We work with DHR to identify women in the state who are currently receiving SNAP and we we help them locate and obtain employment, while they receive a \$100 check every month in exchange for their time. In 2020 alone, we 59 assisted women across both Montgomery county and other eligible counties with locating employment, building their resumes, providing uniforms for work, and seeking out education and volunteer opportunities. We look forward to expanding this program in 2021 to help even more women in need!

Positive Living

Positive Living provides supportive services to women diagnosed with HTV returning to prospective communities from prisons and jails locally and throughout the state of Alabama. The program also provides monthly educational groups and HTV prevention education classes at the Black Belt. In 2020, 19 women took part in the program. Sister circle





When 12-year-old Brooke Bennett learned a few years ago that there are girls who "spot" on their clothing because they cannot afford sanitary pads, she was very sad. "That's not right," Brooke told her sister, Breanna. "Every girl needs menstrual items to stay clean and healthy during their period."

Together, the girls started Women in Training, Inc. (WIT), a young women's empowerment organization. WIT's signature program is the #WITKITS Campaign to help alleviate #PeriodPoverty among the 25 percent of American girls who skip school or miss work because they cannot afford menstrual products. WIT provides monthly donations to at-risk girls and non-binary youth of #WITKITS, which are branded canvas bags full of menstrual, hygiene and dental products. "I thought it was important for the recipients to feel loved, so we also include hand-made bracelets, journals in which we draw inspiring pictures, and fuzzy socks!" Breanna said.


